Dear Trinity Community,

God is love. We hear this and say this and believe this time and again. But how is God love? And how do we share that love?

Last year, when on sabbatical and on a 30-day silent retreat, I had a profound experience of God's love. I was feeling particularly worried that I wasn't "doing" the retreat right, that I was messing up the outcome. As I went deep into this experience I felt a lot of shame.

In my journaling, I wrote my thoughts and feelings to Jesus with my dominant hand and I wrote down what I was hearing Jesus say with my non-dominant hand. It takes a long time to communicate this way but it's effective and really settled deep within me.

I wrote down all my worry and shame. The response (with my non-dominant hand) was life-changing. Jesus said, "I'm right here, Sue. Still by your side. I've always been by your side. I'll always be by your side. Do you believe me?" "Yes," I responded.

These words have stuck with me because I knew and know them to be true – to the deepest part of my being. Before, when I saw a sign or heard someone say "Jesus loves you," it seemed like a simple saying, but now, I am so much more aware of its deep meaning.

That time I spent journaling and focusing on

my relationship with God, the Trinity, provided space for me to be vulnerable with God and to allow Jesus to come to me in ways I never expected.

It's been one year and I am still living into the reality of Jesus being by my side. Healing has taken place in ways I never could have imagined.

Since I have been living into this reality more fully for a year, I find I am so much more at peace, knowing and experiencing Jesus with me and loving me that I am better able to share his love with others. And I know and believe, beyond the shadow of a doubt, that it is true.

The phenomenal thing about Jesus is that he's right here, with you, too. Still by your side. He's always been by your side and he'll always be by your side. There is such a gentleness to him and to his presence. He's not intrusive but his love for you is so strong that he can't bear to be apart from you, loving you beyond measure.

I invite you to take time alone with Jesus this summer to share your thoughts and feelings and to allow him to be present to you in all things. Loving you, you will find a peace that surpasses all understanding that will exude from you to be able to share that same love with others.



The 81st General Convention of the Episcopal Church is in Louisville, KY June 23-28. The juncture of the Dioceses of Eastern and Western Michigan to become the Episcopal Diocese of The Great Lakes will be voted on for ratification. Once this occurs, we will officially become the new diocese at our Diocesan Convention October 18-19, 2024 in Mt. Pleasant at Soaring Eagle.

The Gospel of Luke is the only gospel to omit the detail of the sour wine mix that was offered to Jesus on a reed, while only Mark and John describe Joseph of Arimathea actually taking down the body of Jesus from the cross. Some details are only mentioned in one gospel. For instance, only Matthew mentions an earthquake and the resurrected saints who went to the city of Jerusalem, and that Roman soldiers were assigned to guard the tomb.

As we celebrate the centennial of the Reredos (altar screen with wood carvings) in their telling the story of Jesus, may we more deeply study our faith and ponder the mystery of Christ's love for us and for all the world.

Alois Lang's carvings have been giving a silent sermon for 100 years (1924-2024). Please take some time and check out the Historical Guild's new showcase highlighting the Reredos.





MEMORIAL DAY AND FOUR TRINITY MEN

Monday, May 27th, was the official Memorial Day celebration. Most of you can remember that Memorial Day was originally May 30th—designated by the president of the Grand Army of The Republic because the flowers would be in bloom. Families in the South had their own Memorial Days following the end of the Civil War and later agreed to also hold Memorial Day on May 30th. In 1971 it was declared a federal holiday and placed on the 4th Monday in May although some states still celebrate on the 30th.

The United States celebrates 3 patriotic holidays—Memorial Day, Independence Day, and Veteran's Day. I found an explanation of the difference between each holiday from the Veterans of Foreign Wars—Veteran's Day celebrates all those who have served our nation in our armed forces; the 4th of July of course celebrates the formation of our nation; and Memorial Day recognizes the sacrifice of those who lost their lives defending our nation. I'd like to tell you about the 4 men from Trinity who lost their lives in World War II.

Russ Howard Willard, son of Willam A. Luther Willard and Martha Elizabeth White, was born in Bay City in 1918. Russ graduated from Bay City Central. He organized a band in the fall of 1938 to play at local dances and gatherings. In December of 1939 Russ entered the flying

cadet program and reported for basic training in March 1940. He was good enough at piloting to be made an instructor and also served as a recruiter. Russ was killed during a training accident on July 14, 1942, over the Atlantic Ocean. His body was recovered, and services were held at Trinity and Webberville, MI, where he is buried. Twelve fliers from Selfridge Field provided a military escort.

Russ' brother, Dean Douglas Willard, was born in Lansing in 1921. His parents returned to Bay City and Dean graduated from Bay City Central. Dean took over the Willard band after Russ left for the service. Dean enrolled at the

> University of Michigan following high school and enlisted in September of 1942 in the flying cadets program. He was allowed to continue at

the university until he reported for active duty in March of 1943. He served as an instructor in Virginia and Oscoda, MI, until he reported overseas in the spring of 1945. Dean married Nancy Defoe—he had been dating her at the university—in January of 1944. He was killed on his first combat flight to reconnoiter over Germany. His body was recovered and buried by German civilians. After the war ended his body was returned and a service was held at Trinity with a military honor guard and 3 pastors officiating. The University of Michigan granted him a posthumous degree in 1946. Dean is buried next to Russ and other family members at Webberville, MI

As a side note Rhoda Willard, sister to Russ and David, enlisted in the Army Nurse Corps in September of 1942. She served in the war zone and survived the war.

In 1946 the Women's Club of Bay City dedicated a tree in Wenona Park to the sons and husbands of members of the club who died during the war. I suspect that the tree has been lost to progress.

Jane Willard (a Trinity member who died in February of 2022) married the remaining Willard son—William A. Luther Willard Jr.—in 1949 and although she never met the military Willards, I'm sure she heard stories!!

Sydney Frederick James Bennett was born in England and came to America with his parents at 11 months. The Bennetts settled in Quanicasee and Sydney graduated from Bay City Central in 1941. He took a job at Jennison Hardware working alongside his father. Sydney enlisted in the Army in February 1943 and fought across Belgium, Holland and Germany. Sydney was a rifle team leader and was killed on the 7th of February 1945 in Germany. His body is buried in the Netherlands American Cemetery. The war in Europe ended May 8th, 1945.

Sydney's first cousin is Patricia Jackman—we know her as Pat Middleton.



Our last military casualty was Jacob Howard Koch. Jacob was born in 1918 in Bay City. He was the youngest of

4 children. His father and mother died in 1934 and Jacob lived with an aunt and grandmother until he entered the Navy in 1936. Before the war, he served in the northern Atlantic on convoy duty and eventually was posted to the battleship USS New Mexico. He served in the South Pacific on board the New Mexico and took part in the attacks on several islands in the Pacific. Jacob was wounded during a kamikaze attack off the coast of Okinawa and died of his wounds on May 12, 1945. He is interred at Arlington Cemetery.

It's estimated that 16 million
Americans served during World War II.
There were over 400,000 casualties from that number. Michigan sent over 600,000 people to serve with over 10,300 casualties. Bay County had over 250 casualties who gave their all for us.

The Crucifixion of Our Lord

The crucifixion of Our Lord is one of the central themes of the Christian faith. Christians believe that Jesus died for the sins of the whole world. His suffering and death paid the cost for our sins.

Crucifixion was a method of capital punishment used among the ancient peoples surrounding the Mediterranean basin from about the 6th century B.C. to the 4th century A.D. The practice was finally banned by the emperor Constantine the Great in 337 A.D. out of respect for Jesus Christ.

The cross, occasionally even the crucifix, was used for private devotion during the three centuries. The early first Christians avoided generally representing the body of Christ on the cross. Until the 4th century, even the simple cross rarely appeared in public. However, when Constantine embraced Christianity a time of peace came to the Church. He claimed to have seen the cross in the heavens and even had it inscribed on the shields of his soldiers. Crucifixion was abolished as a death penalty and in time the cross appeared everywhere in public places.

The story of the crucifixion is told by all four gospel writers. According to Matthew, Mark, Luke and John, the Roman soldiers mocked Jesus for claiming to be the King of the Jews. They dressed Him in a red robe, placed a crown of thorns on His head and put a reed in His hand. Some of the men struck Him and later cast lots for His clothing.

The Gospel of John informs us that Jesus carried His own cross to the place of Crucifixion. According to the other Gospels the soldiers made a man named Simon the Cyrene also carry the cross. They nailed Jesus to the cross outside the city, on a hill called Golgotha (Calvary).
